


# CHAPEL COMMENT

# Dear Fríends,

Elsewhere you will see an article by Kris Seward, our new Curate – what a blessing he will be to the Benefice! It is my hope and prayer that we can be a blessing to him and to Karen his wife, too.

He is, of course, joining us at a time when life has become very different for everyone and, whilst the lockdown is easing, major challenges remain. There are personal, everyday challenges over which we have significant control, but there are also those that impact us more generally whether locally, nationally, or internationally. Whatever they are, though, they are challenges that constantly remind us of what we have left behind – things like the choice to socialise with whoever we want, to go to the cinema, the pub, or out for a meal. Even sending our children to school has become something of a risk benefit analysis. Things we took for granted are now to be treasured or longed for.

Most of us who read this will, though, continue to take for granted the fact that we will be treated justly; that people looking at us won't, consciously or subconsciously, judge us to be somehow less able, possibly more dangerous, and certainly not "one of us". I am, of course, thinking Black Lives Matter, and I must continue to think this when the phrase is not front and centre of the news.

Too often, it seems to me, there has been a great outcry again racial prejudice, and then a rapid descent into apathy - until such time as another horrific injustice raises the issue once more. It mustn't go on. We can't continue to allow "black lives" to matter less than others. It's easy to say that we don't, easy to say that the colour of someone's skin is irrelevant to us, but there is a good deal of evidence to suggest "people of colour" have to constantly demonstrate that they don't fit a stereotype which we, white people, have developed – and developed on the basis that they are less than equal to us.

As Christians, we have been as guilty as anyone, with the Bible used in this country to justify slavery, just as it was used by Wilberforce and others to end it. God gave us his Holy Spirit to guide us into all truth - to interpret the Bible in the light of Christ's love, and not in the darkness of fear, prejudice and profit.

We need to be clear in our own hearts and minds that God created all human beings in his image – nowhere in the Bible does it say "white" human beings; there is no qualification of any kind. Diversity is inherent in creation, to be celebrated, affirmed and embraced.


Having found that clarity, it is still a difficult debate to step into; we may feel we risk being criticised for the language we use, for cultural appropriation, or for simply not understanding the issue because we are white.

But whilst I can never fully understand what it's like to be black, what I do understand is that God's justice is utterly colour blind and that tragically, time and time again, human history teaches us that the justice we dispense is not.

## Mary Magdelene

Mary of Magdala was a leading figure among those attracted to Jesus. When the men in that company abandoned him at the hour of mortal danger, Mary of Magdala was one of the women who stayed with him, even to the Crucifixion. She was present at the tomb, the first person to whom Jesus appeared after his resurrection and the first to preach the "Good News" of that miracle She was declared a saint by the Catholic Church in 1969 and in 2016 Pope Francis declared her Feast Day as July 22<sup>nd</sup>.
