By the me that you have this magazine in your hand it will likely be the beginning of Passion de, which begins on the Fi h Sunday of Lent when the focus moves to the prepara on for Palm Sunday, and Jesus' triumphal journey into Jerusalem, and then the last week of His earthly life, during the week we know as Holy week which culminates in the Last Supper with his disciples, his betrayal by Judas Iscariot, his arrest in the garden of Gethsemane, the trial, during which the disciple Peter denied that he knew the Lord Jesus, and finally on Good Friday, the terrible, brutal and barbaric death of Jesus by crucifixion. The disciples must have been petrified at his death, because they were s Il not sure what Jesus had been teaching them about hope that was to come a er his crucifixion when he rose from the dead on Easter morning; that joyous morning when the resurrec on of Jesus is celebrated by Chris ans, Alleluia. Christ is Risen.

It is something that we long for people to know and understand. That is the mission of the Church. The worldwide situa ons that we currently face do not engender themselves for us to be joyous and to live with hope. All around us we see change which many people find distressing, unse ling, and far from the "Good old days" that many people remember about carefree days in which they grew up, not always free from abject poverty and fear of how all the bills would be paid, their homes heated and food placed on the table, but a simpler way of life, surrounded by family and a neighbourhood community which looked out for, and helped each other get through the tough mes free from personal fear of fraud, having their es stolen, free from the impact of a war being fought a long way from here but having great impacts on our lives in so many ways. I wonder what would happen if we all spoke of the miracle that was, that is Easter, the death and resurrec on of Jesus, who removed the total pain of nothingness a er death, and fills our lives with joy in life whatever our situa ons, if we turn to him and allow Him to reign in our hearts and help us to love God and love our neighbours as we love ourselves.

Perhaps, like me you are someone who doesn't always welcome and embrace change with wide open arms but needs to move into it gradually, then you can rest easy in the knowledge that God himself and His message do not change. He wants us to be happy, fulfilled people, for us to be His friends and to understand why He gave his gi of His Son to save us. (The answer to that is because He loved us so much He didn't want to be parted from us because of our wayward lives and our wrongdoings). So if you want someone who never changes, if you like to feel enveloped with love then look no further than Jesus.

A very old chorus that I learnt as a youngster goes like this "He's the same today as yesterday, my great unchanging friend. He's the same today as yesterday, just the same unto the end, By his mighty power he holds me, in his arms of love enfolds me, He's the same today as yesterday, my great unchanging friend."

Thank God for His constancy.

But in all other aspects of life keep in mind that change is inevitable- except from a vending machine!

To close with another cause for hope! The seven Parishes in the Naseby benefice have submi ed the Benefice Profile to the Archdeacon of Northampton for the type of Incumbent we hope to be able to a ract to come to these seven Parishes to work with us and amongst us as we seek to grow the number of those who believe and follow Jesus. Jasmine, whose name means "heavenly felicity". Grows in many parts of the world. In China it is the symbol of beauty, while in India it is known as the "moonlight of the grove". Many Indians brides use it in their wedding bouquet because it symbolises deep affec on. According to legend, many of the world's most beau ful flowers died on Good Friday, overwhelmed by the grief of the Crucifixion. The jasmine however, bore its sorrow bravely but its original pink colouring was washed away by its tears. The following day the jasmine's petals were seen to be very pale and they have remained so ever since.
