Dear Fríends,

Some thoughts about Christmas

Many of you may be reading this in the runup to Christmas. You may have started your preparations, perhaps by sending out of Christmas cards with their expected messages of 'Peace and Joy' and 'Goodwill to all'.

Re-telling the Christmas story and celebrating its importance provides a basis for some of the most memorable times for children and adults alike. This may be especially so when it means reuniting with family and friends, exchanging gifts and simply enjoying quality time together on Christmas Day. In our more contemplative moments, we may wonder how the message and spirit of Christmas sit with the prevailing context of intolerance, inequality and fake news that seems to dominate the discourse around multiple situations we see at home and worldwide.

How, we may ask ourselves, can the positive and peaceful message of Christmas, cut through the many divisions we see developing in our increasingly fractured world.

Biblical history shows us that humankind has always been beset by difficulties that may be as much personal and attitudinal as they are geo-political. An example of this can be found in Paul's letter to the Romans. The Apostle Paul we may remember, was not one of Jesus' disciples, but received a direct revelation from God through which he was given the task of spreading the Christian message and leading work to grow the early Church.

Paul embarked on his important mission by travelling beyond what we now call the Holy Land to embrace a wide expanse across Asia and Europe. This took him into the pagan cultures of both the Greeks and of the Romans. What he found in Rome were numbers of people wishing to convert to Christianity but finding obstacles being placed in their way by Christians who were of Jewish descent.

We can imagine the difficulties, can't we? The gentile Christians adopting Christianity as the basis of a completely new faith and one very different from their pagan backgrounds. Meanwhile, many Jewish converts felt that Christianity relied on building on customs and practices that they and their families had followed for generations. It was a volatile situation and a tricky one for Paul to resolve.

Paul was unequivocal in his view that the Christian Church would only truly 'get off the ground' if its followers were prepared to put Christian unity first and foremost in their considerations and to see issues of cultural heritage and individual preferences as secondary.

As tempers rose and agreement seemed far away, Paul was unflinching in telling believers to: 'live out' their faith, to place equality and cohesion as central. He understood the reasons for discord, but he challenged them to act in ways that aligned with the faith they professed

"Be devoted to one another in love,' he insisted. 'Honour one another above yourselves. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction and faithful in prayer. Share with people who are in need and practice hospitality. [Romans 12:10&12] Paul's words still resonate with such compelling relevance] in today's complex and more disunited world.

We may even ask ourselves if we as individuals, communities and governments were to adopt the principles espoused by Paul 2000 years ago, perhaps our world could become one in which "Peace and Goodwill" would be seen and felt all around us....and not just at Christmas!

WELFORD VILLAGE HALL ACCESSIBLITY IMPROVEMENTS

The Village Hall Committee has commissioned improvements to the accessibility of the Village Hall.

Thanks to the grants obtained because of lockdown and the careful management of finances. There are sufficient funds available to change, for the better, access to the Village Hall. We have been advised that the steps up from the street are posing significant potential hazards of slips, trips, and falls, and that the existing slope is not fit for purpose as a ramp for people using wheelchairs and other mobility aids. The improvements will be a longer ramp with a much reduce slope that will go from the current emergency exit at the right-hand end of the building, through what is currently a garden area, along to the front door. The existing steps will be removed but the current ramp will be left in place and will continue to provide access directly from the car park for the more able bodied. Those who find the slope too steep will be able to walk up West Street and gain access to the hall by way of the new ramp.

Work is scheduled to commence towards the end of January. Inevitably, the work will cause some disruption along West Street. The local contactor, STJ (Northants) Ltd., will do all he can to minimise the problem but there may be occasions when there are deliveries, particularly concrete, when the road will be blocked for a time. We have planned to keep the disruption minimal for all our regular users and the public and hope that all will appreciate the improvements to a well-used and popularvillage amenity.
