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St. Mary the Virgin, Welford

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Dear Friends,

Injustice is a topic getting much attention in the media just now. The Post Office Horizon Scandal has been described as the UK¢s ÷widest miscarriage of justice¢ We are outraged by the way people like us (ie. sub-postmasters) have become victims of machinations of large institutions (ie. the Post Office and Fujitzu) as they have sought to protect their interests.

This is but one example. There are several enquiries currently running, notably the COVID enquiry, and these expose injustices. Journalists investigate one situation after another, exposing outrageous abuses. We feel strongly that justice should be done ô and seen to be done ô and that those wronged should see those who wronged them held to account.

I remember watching a BBC TV series on the Secret Life of Kids some years ago. The cameras followed the development of young children in groups, observed by educational psychologists and specialists who drew out their behaviours as they learned to socialise. One episode showed how even pre-verbal infants were keenly sensitive to any unfairness shown by the adults caring for them. If the carer showed bias or favouritism in playing simple games with the group, the toddlers would avoid that adult—thereafter. A sense of justice is deeply rooted in us.

Unsurprisingly, justice and injustice feature much in the Bible. One of the best-known stories concerns King Solomon. As the top judge of the day he has to rule on a dispute between two women, both of whom claim the same baby as their own.

Famously, he threatens to divide the baby. The real mother, seeing the life of her baby in jeopardy, proposes the infant is given to her rival. Solomon rejects the claim of the rival and the real mother has her child. He is applauded for his wisdom. Seeking the truth is often the key to resolving a dispute but often very hard to draw out.

Whether ito what is right or just for an individual or for the nation, the topic comes up again and again in the Bible.

Via Moses, God gives a basic system of laws: the Ten Commandments, setting out the foundation for systems of law including our own. After that, Moses spent a lot of his time resolving countless disputes and contentions arising among the Israelite people as they wandered in the desert for 40 years.

Laws set a basis for doing justice but over time tend to grow ever more complex. Micah, one the prophets of old whose words are recorded in the Bible, reflected on what God expects of us and with refreshing simplicity concluded that it is: #to act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your Godø(Micah 6v8). I canøt help thinking that our national and global rulers as well as institutional executives would do well to take this wise advice.

Jesus often railed against injustice and abuses of power. He saw how powerful individuals and institutions acted unjustly and with impunity towards the poor and powerless. He cut through petty regulations and encouraged people to live with integrity and deal with others on a basis of love.

Lent begins this month and so does our journey of reflection upon the events leading up to Easter. Justice and Injusticeøis one of the topics in the upcoming Lent Group series, starting in Welford on the afternoon of Wednesday 21st February. Why not come along and join the discussion? (See details in the following pages). By crucifixion Jesus himself became victim of an outrageous injustice. He spoke out against the self-serving rulers and their institutions, both secular and religious. To get him silenced the authorities contrived charges and manipulated the judicial process. He experienced what it is like to be on the receiving end.

Today the risen Jesus stands in solidarity with those who find themselves victims of injustice.

In leave you to ponder where you think Jesus stands on the injustices which make our blood boil today.
