

Dear Friends,

With spring well and truly here and summer on its way, we can see new life all around usô new buds, new lambs running in the field. This is often a sensory experience, where we can witness the goodness of our Creator. Psalm 34:8 says, "Taste and see that the Lord is good."

The theologian Jürgen Moltmann says that in bread and wine at Holy Communion where we remember the death and resurrection of Jesus, we taste and see the goodness of God. As we emerge from Easter and remember what the risen Lord Jesus has done, we can see that His resurrection was revealed in a deeply sensory manner. He likely connected with people's dominant senses, allowing them to taste, see, hear, smell and feel the goodness of God.

For Mary, she heard Jesus's voice and wanted to cling to Him, to touch Him.

Thomas wanted to touch the nail marks and the spear marks in Jesus's side.

For the disciples on the road to Emmaus, they saw Jesus taking bread and breaking it, and in doing so, they saw the risen Jesus afresh. For Peter and the other disciples fishing on the lake, Jesus built a fire, cooked fish with them, and ate with them ó stimulating smell and taste. All of these disciples had to make a leap from their understanding to their hearts, and it was through these sensory experiences that they came to realise the risen Jesus among them.

I wonder how God is speaking to us through our different sensesô through hearing, touch, smell, taste, and sight? How Jesus revealed himself to the disciples tells us that faith is not just what we know or believe but it is also how we experience his presence with us.

As we approach Pentecost, the sensory experiences continue: the wind, the fire, hearing different languages, laughter, and joy as the Holy Spirit empowered His disciples to witness for Jesus. God's empowering presence now dwelling within us.
