Dear Friends

For me and my family this year has brought many changes including the unexpected privilege of being asked to cover ministry within the Naseby group of churches while you are still looking for a new vicar. Over the past few weeks I have enjoyed being able to lead worship in nearly all of the churches in the group. As I have been so warmly welcomed into the many different communities which make up this benefice I have found myself reflecting that the different village communities seem to be as different as their incredibly beautiful churches. Thank you all for making me so welcome, thank you for the opportunity to lead you in worship and thank you for giving me this chance to pray with and for you.

Somehow November always feels like a month of reflection and looking back. The evenings seem longer and darker after we put the clocks back at the end of October and throughout the month the days seem to get noticeably shorter. In the church calendar November seems to be a month full of remembrances. It starts with All Saintsqday when we remember those who have gone before us as Christians and give thanks for their lives. Then comes All Souls day when we remember people who we have known and loved and who have died. In many churches this is marked with a service at which candles are lit and in this benefice there is a service at Clipston to remember the people whose funerals have been held in any of the churches in the benefice throughout this year as well as those who died some time ago but for whom we still mourn.

Following this on 11th November and on the Sunday after, at services at war memorials and in churches across the benefice, we hold various acts of remembrance. At these we remember those soldiers, sailors and airmen from the villages in our benefice who died in the two world wars, and in the many conflicts since, and we also remember in our prayers all those whose lives have been changed forever by armed Away from the busyconflicts. ness and excitement of Christmas and New Year the long dark evenings of November can be a time to look back on our own lives over the past year and to reflect on all that has happened to us whether good or bad. Perhaps this November could be a time when as Christians we may want to consider where we have noticed Godos presence in our lives throughout the year. Perhaps it is a time to think about what we have learned through the years many and varied experinotice how our faith has grown and deences or a time to veloped throughout the year.

November often ends with the beginning of Advent and a chance to begin to look forward as Gods plan to heal our broken world and broken relationships begins to unfold. This year because of the way that Christmas falls on a Monday we will have to wait until December for Advent Sunday but I am already very much looking forward to getting to know you better over the weeks and months ahead as we discover together what God has planned for me and for you as individuals, as churches and as a benefice.


