We wish to announce the sad death of Adelaide Martin who died, two weeks after celebrating her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday in a west Wales nursing home, on August 30th. She is survived by her husband John (age 101) who continues to live an independent life in their seaside bungalow.

Adelaide Martin, formerly Adelaide Jarman, was born in Clipston on August 15<sup>th</sup>, 1923. She attended Sibbertoft school and then Market Harborough grammar school before joining the WAAF during WW2.

She married John Martin in Sibbertoft parish church in September 1945. Together, with their two children, Nicholas and Jeremy, they resided in Sibbertoft until the 1970s.

You can use any kind of art/craft/textile/ music etc that you want and make it as simple or as detailed as you wish, and we will be looking for creativity.


There will be prizes for the winning entry in each class as well as a small gift for everyone that enters and these will be awarded at a service near to Christmas (TBA)
